MICDA WORKING GROUPS UPDATE



ECOSYSTEMS MONITORING

Our World Heritage Island Community Action Program (CAP) Project has introduced new hands-on citizen science activities and fun events for our Island community.

1. Under Alma Reef Training

This month a group of regular Alma Bay swimmers and Apex Camp Activity Instructors will be working with marine biologists from the Great Barrier Reef Marine Park Authority to increase reef knowledge and monitor underwater marine life in our bays. Training will include how to record sightings through the *Eye on the Reef* Monitoring App and reporting unusual activity. We highly recommend that everyone downloads this free app.

2. Mangrove Monitoring

As a result of the Monitoring on Magnetic workshop in May, a small group has been formed to help monitor our beautiful mangrove systems in Picnic, Geoffery and Horseshoe Bays. A group of passionate local volunteers enjoyed training with expert scientists from MangroveWatch to help protect our Island mangroves, and record valuable baseline data.

3. Maggie on Tap Island Pub Talks are a hit!

If you have not yet joined a Maggie On Tap Island Pub Talk, come along to a local Island venue near you. Hear from local scientists and experts about fascinating island topics on our precious ecosystems and marine life. So far we have enjoyed learning about our turtles, seagrass, fringing reefs, sea mammals, sharks and rays, our underwater sanctuaries, and this month the topic will be our native plants. Come

REEF ASSIST PROJECT

1.5 years+ of creek rehabilitation with weeds converted to Humisoil

The Reef Assist team have been working on our Island for well over a year and a half now, and have rehabilitated many creek lines and vulnerable areas where weeds have been removed and native plants fostered and replanted to help control erosion. The weeds have been converted into Humisoil and we now have a fantastic resource to put back onto our plantings to help the soil rehabilitation, and improve water holding capacity.

Three of our team recently were part of a Syntropic Conference and are now using this technique which incorporates regenerative agricultural techniques to rehabilitate further areas of our Island. Working near the Butterfly Walk in Horseshoe Bay, they have been removing *Mother of Thousands* (MOT) and *Mother in Laws Tongue* (MILT) and creating Syntropic "Nests". Humisoil is added to the "nest" with weeds that have been found on site and cleared, as well as mulch and small logs etc. After initial watering the site is left to begin its natural processes of breaking down the plant matter, then growing native plants from the seeds. The roots form an intricate web of communication between the plants.

Increased water holding capacity and soil microbes

These nests build up the water holding capacity of the soil and encourage native soil microbes to repopulate the soils. The team then "seed bomb" the nest with native seeds they have collected from plants on the Island to allow the natives to re-establish themselves. A mixture of grasses, small shrubs and taller trees are part of the mix so a natural layered canopy will develop over time and encourage our native fauna. This process assists with erosion control and soil retention, as well as nurturing the native plants.

New biogen to convert food waste to liquid fertiliser

This very enthusiastic team are working in many areas of our Island and will soon be involved in converting food waste into a useful natural liquid fertiliser with our <u>Biogen</u> – more information will be available in our next edition.

WALLABY REFUGE

Please BE AWARE!

With the changing of the seasons we are seeing changes in the activities and an increase in the movements of all wildlife on the Island. The Wallaby Refuge continues the theme of asking people to please 'Be Aware'.

At 1.30am the other day this little joey was found on the road on the hill between Arcadia and Horseshoe Bay. He was located a short distance from his deceased mum. The rescuer spoke of just seeing the little head raise up. This Allied Rock Wallaby joey weighed only 98 grams on admission. He has been in care for 8 days, and now weighs 114 grams.

As specialists in the care of these little joeys and remembering that our planet is in an ecological danger, we believe the saving of each one, not only by us but most importantly by the rescuers, is a favour for our planet.

YUNBENUN-MAGNETIC ISLAND NATIONAL PARK VOLUNTEERS

Fields of weeds are a big challenge for our volunteers

This year, due to the regularity of rain, all the sites that we work at have shown very good growth of local plants and of weeds. We have been working very hard to get on top of these weed infestations, including an extra session to completely clear Florence Bay of periwinkle. We were helped by Arcadia Coastcare which was great. Other sites worked include Endeavour Creek, Nelly Bay Lagoon and West Point. Outbreaks of *mother-of-millions* weed have been particularly prolific!

There has been a smaller number of volunteers for the last couple of sessions as people take the opportunity to travel. We are looking forward to completing our 15th year in November.

We meet fortnightly, March to November, on alternate Saturday mornings. The goal is to restore and maintain areas of National Park as flourishing natural environments. The work of the group is overseen by the National Park Rangers, supported by Magnetic Island Nature Care Association, and guided by Cate Paton. Some areas, such as Endeavour Creek, are managed by National Parks together with the traditional owners.

We welcome new members who can be assured of an enjoyable morning weeding with the

FITNESS

Swimming Pool Working Group

This Working Group was formed because after decades of community being able to access the Magnetic Island Community and School Swimming Pool this access was stopped due to the cessation of funding from the TCC. The purpose of the MICDA Swimming Pool Working Group is to coordinate community access of the pool through liaison with the school.

MICDA sought support and funding from the TCC for a recurring yearly budget allocation of funds to enable management of the Community's access to the pool through a specific proposal. The proposal is to open the pool for community use only for 2 hours a day for 7 days a week, and at times to be negotiated with other current commercial uses and school use. The Community has demonstrated an overwhelming support for their access to the pool and to get the funding from TCC with 1400 signatures on a petition that was submitted with the proposal. The petition was also organized by this working group.

MICDA presented the proposal and petition to Mayor Jenny Hill, Councillor Ann-Maree Greaney and at a Council meeting in July. MICDA is still awaiting a response from the TCC.



ZERO WASTE

What have we been up to, and were are we going?

We have achieved some great things in raising awareness of the need to be more mindful of our waste, but we also need your help (big or small) to keep making a difference.

Our achievements since inception include:

- Zero Waste Survey in 2019.
- Community Action Planning Workshop 2019.
- Production of an educational video <u>'Little Things Matter'</u> for preschool children.
- Creation of Zero Waste Magnetic Island information website and Facebook page.
- Newsletter published both on our website and Facebook pages.
- Establishment of a Containers For Change weekly Island collection and 24/7 collection pod.
- Threads Workshops for textile creations and repair, and a <u>Threads Facebook</u> page.
- Water On Tap project and map, highlighting the fact that Townsville tap water
 is safe to drink, there are many locations around Magnetic Island where you
 can fill up for free, and you don't have to buy single-use plastic bottles.
- 2021 Zero Waste Exhibition "Don't Waste Christmas", with great ideas for gifts and cards.
- Monthly information stall at the Horseshoe Bay Markets, and distribution of reusable mesh produce bags to replace plastic bags - made by our small band of volunteers.
- Effectively lobbying the Townsville City Council for the establishment of a Bio-

<u>ReGen</u> Unit on the Island for the processing of commercial food waste and plant material.

We've got a bunch of great ideas but without your help they are just ideas:

- Develop recycling instruction kits, and approaching holiday rental managers to include these kits in properties with the message to holiday makers - DON'T WASTE MAGNETIC ISLAND.
- Gather volunteers to help <u>Shed 3</u> to produce products with the plastic lids they have in storage.
- Market recycled plastic products to raise funds for Zero Waste MI and to assist Shed 3 in their efforts.
- Establish sustainable plastic lid collection and sorting on the Island.
- Offering household assessments and education to help people get closer to Zero Waste in their homes.
- Encourage Zero Wasters to make short videos of their efforts at home and publish them on the Zero Waste Facebook page.
- Encouraging gardening on the verge!
- The creation of an upcycled clothing show.

We love new ideas but what we need is ACTION!

The grant, under the Community Sustainability Action Grants Program, allows the engagement of a Coordinator for a community led project that encourages greater participation, and helps deliver, climate action in Queensland.

The Coordinator will work with Magnetic Island community-based groups that are focused on solutions to decarbonisation, managing climate risks, improving climate resilience and sustainable development in order to develop a community "Whole of Island" plan for Magnetic Island's Future.

MARINE

Marine Update

Coral spawning

Coral spawning is occurring around the island in October, and a second spawn may occur in line with offshore reefs around 22 - 24 November, although you will need to be up late with spawning likely to commence after midnight. Trichodesmium algae (actually a cyanobacteria) blooms often also occur around this time of year and are commonly mistaken as coral spawn. Coral spawn is generally pink whilst Trichodesmium is typically brown until it washes ashore and breaks down, when it can undergo a colour change.

Turtle Nesting

It's almost that time of year when turtles will be nesting on most beaches around the island, and **we kindly remind people not to light fires or drive on the beaches.**Please also check where your dog may be digging when walking the beaches, so that they don't disturb a nest.
